

Future forms - Handout

There are several different ways in English that you can talk about the future. Here are only three ways:



1) For predictions / Fact about the future

The auxiliary verb **will** is used in making predictions or simple statements of fact about the future.

- It **will** rain tomorrow.
- I think the sun **will** rise at 7 am.
- I'll buy a new car next year.
- Yurem **will not be** the next manager.
- There **won't be** any snow.
- **Will** you go to the party? Yes I **will**.
- Who do you think **will** get the job? Caleb **will** get it.



2) For intentions (be going to + verb)

The auxiliary verb **going to** is used in talking about intentions.

- She **is going to** buy a new dress tonight.
- I'm **going to** work in a hospital when I leave school.
- We **are not going to** do exercise. We are tired.
- **Are you going to** play volleyball after school? -No, I'm not.
- What **are you going to** have for lunch today? -We **are going to** have ribs.



3) For arrangements (present continuous)

The **present continuous tense** is used for talking about arrangements (future plans).

- Kim **is** traveling to New York next week.
- Our grandparents **are** visiting us this Christmas.
- My sister's **going** to the dentist tomorrow.
- They're **not** selling the house.

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
